# CORN CLASSROOM

On the first day of school children were excited, nervous, and a little scared of their new surroundings as they were seeing our new school. New teachers, friends and a big school was something new! Teachers introducing themselves and informing them what should be happening throughout the school year was the focus. Some cried but their fears went away as they made new friends, played with toys and on the new playground. We are looking forward to a great school year!

# FIRE CLASSROOM



In our classroom, the children have transitioned smoothly from home to school. The children observed the classroom areas and all the activities they would be working on, hands on and teacher directed. We are teaching the children school readiness. We introduce rules and routines in and outside the classroom. During circle time they are working on their attention span as well as their singing skills. We are also learning our Indian names and clans. We are in the process of making a clan graph. The corn is in the lead, followed by eagle, coyote, fire, sun, fox, water and canyon people. The children explored the weather and are working with following pedestrian safety rules while on a nature walk. On our nature walk so far we have explored water from a broken pipe near the ditch. Children were able to feel the water. This is just the beginning! We are excited to teach our children more classroom and traditional knowledge.

# SUN CLASSROOM

The teachers and children are excited and happy to start the school year in a new Head Start building. We are in the process of getting to know one another by our Indian names (Towa). We are progressing as children transition from home to school. The children are learning to pray using cornmeal on a daily basis. They are exploring the different areas of the classroom, such as dramatic play, blocks and science. Participating in hands-on learning with a variety of manipulatives is how we learn. They are still adjusting to the daily routines and indoor/outdoor safety rules. Nature walks are taken within the surrounding area of the Head Start for experiential learning. All children participate in an Indian name giving ceremony for a non-tribal child to recieve their Indian name.

## OAK CLASSROOM

The children in the Oak Room have adjusted well in their new school environment. They like exploring different areas, such as housekeeping, puzzles, library and playing with different manipulatives within the classroom.

The students are making new friends and getting to know each others and their Indian names.

All children are happy when coming to school and are curious learners everyday.







### K-6 Hemish Language Immersion Pilot School







It's been an eventful month so far here at Hemish Language Immersion School. Our students have been busy planting seeds and taking care of what is already growing in our garden boxes. We have a healthy tomato plant that is producing many beautiful tomatoes. We recently planted lettuce, rainbow carrots, spring mixed lettuce and spinach. We are learning to grow our own food and talking about how this type of food makes up a healthier diet. It is great to see the excitement when their seeds begin to sprout. Through their observations they are learning the stages of the plants and noting their measurements in their plant journals. While keeping track of these plants and their growth the students are learning about measurement, photosynthesis, and the stages of growth.

The students were invited to dance at the ribbon cutting ceremony of our new Walatowa Early Childhood Learning Center. These opportunities help enrich the learning of our traditions and culture. It encompasses many other learning objectives for our students such as social skills, dance etiquette as well as learning of the clothing and reasons why certain dances come at certain times in the year. This instills pride and helps them learn to value the culture and traditions of our Jemez people.

We partnered with Pajarito Environmental Education Center (PEEC) to learn about bird banding. As a part of this partnership, we created our own lessons about the local birds and the students learned of the different types of birds, their habitats, migration paths etc. (all in Jemez). We were able to go to the mountains and have a hands on experience with the bird banding. This unit will culminate into learning how these different birds tie into our cultural traditions and ceremonies.

### K-6 Hemish Language Immersion Pilot School





Our instruction with Montessori is moving along. Our primary students are in an "absorbent stage", working on sensorial material that is working to prepare their minds to organize, classify and abstract information.

Our elementary students have been listening to stories of how our earth came to be and how the earth prepared itself for human beings. Stories of these timelines incorporate history, biology, geography and of course math. This includes working on the Number Base Board and moving into working with the large Bead Frame to gain an in depth understanding of our numbers.

Our goal at our Hemish Language Immersion School is to teach the "whole child". Helping children become truly capable and productive while focusing on the moral, emotional, and intellectual development of our children is our primary goal.



## NORTHERN New Mexico College



#### **Career Technical Education**



We are in our second year of Career Technical Education with Northern New Mexico College and Jemez Valley High School. This partnership was developed in the Fall 2022 with five students enrolled for Dual Credit. JVHS increased the number of students enrolled for the second year to 14 students. The electrical courses are being offer to both year one and year two students. This opportunity provides the college course experience for our Jemez students.



Our Walatowa High Charter School students have begun their first year with Career Technical Education. Our first six students from WCHS are taking electrical courses through Northern New Mexico College. The students will be OSHA certified at the end of the first semester and have college credit that will benefit them after high school.



#### AFFORDABLE CONNECTIVITY PROGRAM

#### WHAT IS ACP?

The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is an FCC administered and US Government funded program designed to help households better afford internet service through their Internet Service Provider.

#### **HOW WILL THIS BENEFIT JEMEZ?**

Jemez' internet service is provided free of charge through the Jemez Pueblo Tribal Network or JNET and funded by COVID Treasury funds. However, the Treasury funds will eventually expire and new funding will be needed. The funds through ACP can be used to improve internet connectivity and expand services to all tribal members and households.

#### **HOW CAN YOU HELP?**

You can help support internet connectivity in Jemez and keep it free by signing up for ACP through JNET. <u>JNET and Education Department staff can assist</u> you with applying for ACP and uploading supporting documentation.

#### ARE YOU ELIGIBLE?

If your household income is at/below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines or a member of your household qualifies for any of the programs listed below, you're household is eligible for ACP:

- •Free and Reduced-Price School Lunch Program
- •Federal Pell Grant •Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance
- •WIC •Tribal TANF
- •SNAP •Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
- •Medicaid •Tribal Head Start (Income based)
- Public Housing
   Affordable Housing Programs for American Indians,
- •SSI Alaska Natives or Native Hawaiians and more.
