Jemez Coordinated School Health Initiative

The Jemez Department of Education developed the Coordinated School Health Initiative to provide comprehensive health and social services to school-aged population who attend the local schools in the Jemez Pueblo area. Historically, the Jemez Department of Education has built a strong partnership with the Jemez Health & Human Services to provide health services to the students of the Hemish Language Immersion Program, San Diego Riverside Charter School, Walatowa Charter High School, and Jemez Day School. The Jemez Coordinated School Health Initiative is a promising program designed to formalize existing and new partnerships, provide wrap around comprehensive services, and build a sustainable system of care for the children of Jemez Pueblo, promoting overall development of children, thereby increasing academic success.

The Jemez Coordinated School Health Initiative is a pro-active solution to address the health disparities that continuously impact American Indian Alaskan Native (AIAN) communities. This framework is designed after the CDC coordinated School Health Model, including community strengths and values unique to AIAN students in Jemez Pueblo. The ten components of the Jemez Coordinated School Health Initiative are:

- health education
- health services
- counseling/psychological services
- health promotion for staff
- governmental involvement
- physical education
- nutrition services
- healthy school environments,
- family/community involvement,
- technology/media

Each of these components is incorporated into a social ecological model that will inform the research and evaluation of the framework. The Jemez Coordinated School Health Initiative will take a mixed-methods evaluative approach to evaluate all the components of the Jemez School Health Initiative Framework.

Upon return from the holiday break, the teachers reiterated and reviewed classroom rules, outdoor safety rules as well as nature walk rules. The teachers informed the children of ceremonies that occurred in the plaza in January. Some of the children shared what they observed with the society initiations. It is considered experiential learning for the children as well as adults. This month, Blue Corn was reintroduced and the children made blue corn tortillas. The class has been focusing on self-help skills; the children are learning and demonstrating, putting on/taking off their jackets, zipping/unzipping to strengthen their fine motor skills and serving themselves during meal times. They are doing a great job in cleaning and picking up after themselves. The children enjoy performing and participating in our school wide daily morning protocol; prayer and dancing conducted outdoors.

The Oak classroom started off to a great new year "2024." We all gave one another a hug to show that we are happy and grateful to see every one back at school. Each child shared and talked about how they spent their holidays with families and what they got for Christmas.

For the month of January, the children were introduced to learning the name of the month, the newly appointed Governors and leadership. We talked about the upcoming cultural events that will be happening for the month. Blue and white corn were also introduced. We talked about how important corn is and what foods can be made with both corn. We first talked about the blue corn and made atole. Some children said their grandma makes some and others said that they have not had atole before. Children are learning from observing and experiencing.

Thursday, February 1 was the first day that the whole school went out to pray together. After we prayed with the corn meal, Lawrence, Delvin and Shawn sang for us to dance. We all danced to butterfly, buffalo and Zuni comanche. The children just love to dance. That is how we have started our mornings everyday if weather permitted. If it was too cold, we danced down the hallway and into our classrooms until the song is over.

The week of February 13th we went on nature walks to observe our village and view the petrified rocks that are within the village. Since it was Heart Health Month, we took nature walks when the weather permitted. The children enjoyed going on walks because they love to observe and get to know where their classmates live.

Oak Classroom Continued...



On February 14, we had Father Engagement Day. Fathers were invited to the school to spend time with their child and to have lunch. Before lunch, the 4 classrooms along with the fathers that went to visit participated in dancing with the children outdoors while Lawrence, Delvin and Shawn sang. It was a great turn out and all the children enjoyed having their fathers at school. In our classroom, they made necklaces.

The day before Valentines, we also made blue corn tortillas. Each child was given a dough to feel the texture and to make one on their own. They enjoyed making and eating them. Mmmm, they were so delicious!

February 16, Behavioral Health Department came in to speak with our students about anger management. Mr Stuart Gachupin taught the children how to use techniques for exercising when they are feeling emotional.

Our newly appointed Governors visited our school, introduced themselves, shared their positions and spoke to the children. The Police Department and the Dental Hygienist also visited the school. Children met and greeted the officers who shared their roles and duties.

We have also been demonstrating self-help skills, taking off/putting on jackets, zipping, snapping, and buttoning, taking off/putting on shoes, Fine Motor Skills, how to hold a utensil, a writing tool and learning how to cut.

Parents, please help your child with this at home too. Do as much as you can for your child. We thank you in advance for all you do for them! We also would like to thank all the fathers who joined our fatherhood engagement day! The children were happy and enjoyed the time they spent with their fathers. They made necklaces.

In Jemez, we have learned parts of the body and recognizing the numbers 1 – 5. We are learning about the landmarks that surround our village and the directions where our Petrified rocks are located. We are excited to do more cultural learning in the upcoming months.

Corn Classroom News

On January, 2024, we resumed school after the holiday break. The children happily talked about what they did over the holidays, presents they received and shared stories about what they observed watching the buffalo dances. We discussed traditional activities including the newly appointed Governors and officials.

Teachers reviewed classroom rules, cleaning up, sharing and helping one another. The children continued working on their self help skills such as tying their own shoe laces and working the zippers, snaps and buttons on their jackets. Children are learning numbers 1 to 5, working on activities that will help them learn to count in Towa. We had lessons on Wildlife and the animals that live in our mountains. The children learned the names of the animals, what they eat and where they live. They also acted out movements of different animals. We reviewed their names, family member's names, body parts, colors and shapes in our Towa language. We had a visit from members of a native tribe from Brazil. The visitors included tribal members and the chief of the tribe. The chief wore traditional clothing and a beautiful feathered headdress. In honor of our guests, the children danced the butterfly and the shield dance. All parents are welcome to visit our Headstart center at anytime. Please have lunch with us and spend time with your child as they learn our Jemez language and traditions.

HEMISH LANGUAGE IMMERSION PILOT SCHOOL



Hemish Language Immersion students were excited to be introduced to audio and video equipment. With Film/AV crew they worked on their filming project. They worked together to film their shots, edited and submitted their final project into the Film Prize Jr. NM film festival.

Our students have been working on various math lessons ranging from large number frame, golden bead material for number base, colored beads for multiplication, checkerboard for multiplication, long chain bead material for geometry and squaring. For language we are learning about the history of the written and spoken language. In geometry we have been introduced to how geometry got it's name and now working on solid shapes. For social studies the students are ending their unit of African American history.

For biology and traditional farming lessons we will be introducing the timeline of life and students will hear how long the earth took to prepare for the human being. Montessori teaches using a cosmic approach. So the earth, the sun, moon the stars and everything in nature becomes a teaching tool as well as the children learning the value and gain the respect for nature. This allows for great opportunity to tie in our Hemish culture, ceremonies, and traditions.

In the daily engagements of our culture and traditions our students are proud to be Jemez learning their connections to their culture and their community. Their pride in the knowledge they have gained through our language and culture lessons as well as their involvement in recent dancing events. Their self-confidence will allow them to thrive and preserve through daily challenges.


Hemish school doors are always open to welcome in any visitors that would like to see our students at work.






IN THE KITCHEN, WHAT'S NEW?
